“WIZARD OF BOULDER PARK” TO BE BROADCAST ON CENTRAL MICHIGAN UNIVERSITY PBS

The Society has received word that Central Michigan University PBS, Channel 6, intends to broadcast “The Wizard of Boulder Park” documentary that premiered here at a more than full Cinema III in June of 2015. The TV showing will take place on **December 1 at 9:30 p.m.** This 48-minute film is an interpretation of the life and works of our legendary builder in stone Earl Young with images and movie stock never shown before, created by three-time Emmy winning sister and brother team Anne and Brian Belanger of Rogers City and Royal Oak. The Society acted as co-producer, and your editor David Miles receives screen credit as “Historical Consultant” in addition to serving as an on-screen “talking head.” The “Wizard” received its broadcast premiere on Detroit PBS last May, with highly positive and appreciative reports coming to the Harsha House in subsequent months via summer visitors from southeast Michigan and a noticeable uptick in sales of the DVD. We are asking every member who might have family and friends within the CMU viewing area to notify them of this program, not only regarding the importance of what Charlevoix has to offer, but also as an example of what support of the Society is able to accomplish.

INVALUABLE DONATION RECEIVED FROM ADVANCED GEOMATICS

Late last spring, the Society received word from Larry and Fay Feindt of the surveying company Advanced Geomatics that they had sold their longtime home, the building across the alley from Cherry Republic in the Bridge Street 200 block, to Luther Kurtz, owner of Charlevoix Cinema III. They needed to clean out decades of documentation, and asked if we would take a look at some of their vintage collection for possible donation. Of about 160 items offered, we have just completed cataloging 144 and placing them in archival storage, all but one of them maps and documents. The lone item is a framed 45 x 37-inch Abrams Aerial Survey photograph of Charlevoix taken in 1938 (the same image used on the title page of our 2002 publication “Bob Miles’ Charlevoix II”). After a little restoration work, it will be hung in the Depot because it shows exactly where the train tracks ran on both sides of town.

The maps and documents date as far back as 1881 and the layout of the Chicago Club, which had begun purchasing its property the year before. Others show large, proposed recreational parks on the south side school property and north side Mercer Boulevard/U. S. 31 land from the mid 1930s; the sightlines available to the lower channel bridge tender when the bridge was both open and closed, taking into account the channel bends, 1929; a proposed layout of a brand new East Park in the mid 1930s; several maps of the original 18 holes of the Chicago Club golf course that later became the municipal course; the locations of the old city water wells near the Lake Michigan Beach and fish hatchery; the original blueprint of the Belvedere Golf Course circa 1926; a 1935 proposed building for the Beaver Island boat company, with warehouse, waiting room and office, that looked like a miniature towered brick castle; a proposed site for a city airport on Marion Center Road just south of Brookside Cemetery

abutting the Belvedere Golf Course, today's Vernida Road area, 1933; a map from 1892 showing the placement of the first water mains laid along Bridge Street from the new water works built just east of today's Ward Brothers; and an undated map from Division Street north past Mt. McSauba into an area called the "Village of Mount McSauba" which later became the North Point subdivision, with property owners' names everywhere.

It was like a Spanish conquistador actually finding El Dorado.
