



Update on the South Pier Lighthouse Project

As mentioned in the last newsletter, a significant project to repair and repaint localized areas of the interior and exterior of the South Pier Lighthouse, along with sealing the lantern gallery, is planned for later this year. Significant sections of the interior walls and ceiling have severely peeled since the last phase of restoration work was done in 2013. Our preservation architect determined that this is caused by mill scale not being removed from all of the steel originally, going back to 1948, which causes condensation to build up.

In summer of 2024, specifications and drawings were requested to have this completely repaired and repainted, including removing the mill scale, along with repairing and repainting areas of the exterior around the lantern base. They were provided by our preservation architect Michelle Smay, who is now with Quinn Evans architectural firm.

The project is estimated to cost much more than we had been planning for in the fundraising endeavors of Lighthouse 75 in 2023, due to escalating costs, scaffolding required for the exterior repairs, proper processes to remove the mill scale and lead abatement on the interior to protect workers and the environment. The total project cost estimate is \$140,000. A \$60,000 grant application was submitted to the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) for a Michigan Lighthouse Assistance Program Grant (MLAP) to support the project in November.


If the grant is awarded, and costs are as planned, sufficient funds are available for our required match, thanks to LH 75 fundraising and another major gift in 2024. However, we will be seeking additional grants and gifts to support the project and replenish reserves for future lighthouse preservation needs.

Looking Back...

Early last August, the Gannett media company cancelled the Historical Society's column, Looking Back, that had been running weekly in the Charlevoix Courier since June of 2011. Over 650 columns, written by Museum at Harsha House Curator David L. Miles, had been published, using reportage from the Charlevoix Sentinel (est. 1869) and the Courier (est. 1908), each one generally illustrated by an archival photo from the museum's collection, or from the Internet. What happened in Charlevoix and environs 150, 100, and fifty years ago were the topics. August 9, 2024 was the final appearance. Later in the year, the Society decided to revive the column, focusing this time on one topic rather than the several that might be found in the newspapers, and without the 150/100/50 years format. This new format has allowed Miles to use more photos from the Society's robust collection to help tell these stories.


Charlevoix Historical Society Financial Situation and Ways to Give



New Treasure Comes to the Museum

The Society recently received an invaluable treasure from local residents Larry and Faye Feindt, former owners of the Advanced Geomatics surveying business. It is a framed, 22" x 22" hand-drawn plat map commissioned by former Charlevoix photographer Daniel S. Way in the early 1890s for his intended development of North Point/Mt. McSauba. Pleasant, Maple, Cedar, and Bay Streets are already named. Two small docks appear off the tip of the point. The house of Chief Louis McSauba, after whom the west part of the area is named, is included, the first time we have known exactly where it was located, the site of today's ice skating and hockey rink on Mt. McSauba Road. To its west, on the Lake Michigan shore, appears a dock with ten boat slips. Above the house, atop the dune, is Way's 1891 "Observatory," a tall wooden tower that people could climb for 25¢ for a spectacular panoramic view of approximately 3000 square miles. Way actually planned to extend Cedar Street all the way west to Lake Michigan where a block-wide "intended hotel" would offer a spectacular sunset view. Stop in to see this priceless addition to our collections.
